Moody Garden's first annual Monarch Madness: A Pollinator Festival was held on Saturday, October 11, 2025 from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm. The festival was held under the big tent at Moody Gardens and was free to attend. Over four hundred guests in attendance learned about local and migrating pollinators. Moody Gardens activity tables included a native plant giveaway, face painting and a symbolic Monarch migration activity. Local vendors were also in attendance to help educate the guests about a variety of topics, from planting a native garden to how to get involved in birding. Other activities included Stroll & Discover walks where guests spent time learning from Moody Gardens Staff, Monarch tagging and birding with the Big Sit ! Event. Six Monarchs were tagged that day and over 48 species of birds were recorded. Sixty symbolic Monarchs were created by children in attendance. These Monarchs will be sent to school children in Mexico, near the Monarch's overwintering site. In the spring, new symbolic Monarchs will be sent back to Moody Gardens to represent the Monarchs spring migration. Over 1,000 native plants were given away to guests to promote starting a pollinator - friendly native garden at home.
