The City of Eaton Rapids is a city of nearly 5,300 residents. We are committed to educating the community and providing examples of why and how monarch butterflies and pollinator insects play an important role in our environments health.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

As part of the May is Monarch Awareness Month in the City of Eaton Rapids, we painted rocks that had various pollinating insects on them. Also included in the kit was a pollinator seed mix to plant a garden and some materials about why pollinators are important along with how to offer water for butterflies in the wild.
