Grandview is a community in west central Missouri with a population of roughly 27,000. The city is a part of the Kansas City metropolitan area and is home to 14 beautiful parks and access to many natural resources. Mayor Jones of Grandview, MO has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with their signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the City.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening
