Pledge Summary

Sugar Grove is a Village in Illinois with a population of roughly 10,000. The Village is home to many parks and open spaces and we would like to incorporate more native pollinator habitat and community gardens. The newly elected Village President of Sugar Grove, Sue Stillwell has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout Sugar Grove.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

We started the Sugar Grove Beautification and Gardening Committee! We used both Social Media and Print Media to invite new volunteers to participate and plant their own Monarch Garden as well as participate in expanding community gardens

Our Public Works Director is actively involved in helping Sugar Grove increase the number of native plants and assisted in ordering bulk native plant seeds including milkweed for a local area (20 + acres) that had previously been mostly ragweed and invasives. We are also communicating with the Illinois Department of Transportation and providing comments regarding increasing natives on an upcoming project and reviewing options for reduced mowing if low growing natives are introduced

Ordinance 4-4-1 was updated to allow managed natural landscapes, flowers, gardens, cultivated prairie plants and native plants: All premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from weeds or plant growth in excess of eight (8) inches. All noxious weeds shall be prohibited. Weeds shall be defined as all grasses, annual plants, and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs; however, the term shall not include cultivated prairie plants, flowers and gardens or managed natural landscapes. No brush, tree, or other growth shall be permitted to obstruct, restrict, or encroach upon any public sidewalk, alley, street, parkway, or any easement. If it is determined that plantings are obstructing site lines where cultivated prairie plants or managed natural landscapes are grown in property areas that are typically occupied by lawn (mowed) grasses, the property owner shall provide a buffer strip twenty-four (24) inches wide, abutting the public right of way as a border to prevent encroachment and protect sight lines. Native prairie plants are those defined by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.
