We work with our Friends of the Sandusky Greenhouse volunteers (20 members) about Monarch and pollinator importance. We also have a naturalist with Erie MetroParks on site on a monthly basis for nature hikes including butterfly and insect instruction.

Our Out of School and seasonal break programs include a nature component where a naturalist from Erie MetroParks takes our participants on a nature hike of an adjacent creek to our facility.

We are currently undergoing a \$900k project to restore a wetlands area at our Mills Creek Golf Course. The project will help with runoff and clean a local tributary to Lake Erie.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and associated opportunities to create monarch habitat.

We have a Wetlands Restoration project going on at our nine hole municipal golf course that started in November of 2025 and will wrap up in April of 2026. In working with the Erie County Soil & Water Conservation District, it is our intent to plant monarch and pollinator friendly species once the project is complete. The project is utilizing H2Ohio funding.
