Orono is a city in Minnesota with an approximate population of 8,000. Nestled on the western shores of Lake Minnetonka, it is renowned for its lush, wooded landscapes and expansive lakeside properties, which create a stunning blend of natural beauty and architectural elegance. Mayor Bob Tunheim has committed to protecting the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. He looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

We were in contact with the Orono Community Garden and the Orono Garden Club, giving them supplies for their gardens and shared info that they distributed to their members and the public.

Parks and public works both participated in updating their standard practices to include additional milkweed planting throughout the city and in modifying maintenance and mowing techniques to minimize disruption to current milkweed and other pollinators already present in the city.

We had regularly scheduled meetings to discuss sustainability and mowing techniques. Native planting areas were identified and protected from right-of-way mowing, and areas in parks were marked and protected from mowing and other disruptions.

We planted a pollinator garden on our city hall grounds at 2750 Kelley Parkway in Orono.

We are currently in the process of completing a comprehensive review of all chemicals that are used in the city and their effect on pollinators and other wildlife. Parks and the golf course have already switched to safer chemicals, and the department has greatly reduced the use of chemicals in parks and trails.
