Kennedale is a growing city with a population of 8500, located on the south edge of the Dallas/Fort Worth metroplex. Our city works in collaboration with the Keep Kennedale Beautiful Commission to manage and maintain the city's pollinator garden and Monarch Waystation located in the heart of Kennedale at TownCenter Park. Surrounded by the Library, City Hall, and Senior Center, TownCenter Park is where many of our community events are held, giving our citizens and visitors access to our garden. Mayor Joplin and the City of Kennedale are striving to create a more pollinator friendly community by engaging residents and promoting the importance of milkweed, native plants and pollinators. Keep Kennedale Beautiful is comprised of appointed members of the board as well as volunteers from around the community who have a love for our city and a passion to preserve the beauty that is around us. Our Butterfly Party was open to all who where interested. The local school advertised the event, the city promoted the event on the city website, the Library Staff helped with flyers and promotional material. The party was on a Saturday from 9-11am and the main attraction was a tent with live butterflies that were released at the end of the event. The tent demonstration included how to and why to tag Monarch. We had demonstrations showing eggs, caterpillars, pupa, and hatched butterflies. Handouts with information and examples of common easy to grow native plants and why they are important to sustaining the migration of the Monarch. We raffled native plants, butterfly cages and butterfly books. As we partnered with the library and were able to work together to engage all levels of knowledge from preschoolers to professionals.

KKB maintains the butterfly garden and several other flowerbeds in the Town Center Park. We strive to plant mostly native and other nectar or habitat producing plants. Three (3) new Butterfly Weed were added to the garden this year along with thirty (30) additional native plants. An additional 700 annual nectar plants were planted in the spring and fall.
