This park is surrounded by key landmarks, including the Library, City Hall, and Senior Center, and serves as the venue for many community events, making the garden accessible to both residents and visitors. Under the leadership of Mayor Joplin, the City of Kennedale is dedicated to creating a more pollinator-friendly community. By engaging residents and promoting the importance of milkweed, native plants, and pollinators, the city is fostering a sustainable environment for future generations. Keep Kennedale Beautiful is made up of appointed board members and passionate volunteers who share a deep love for the city and a commitment to preserving its natural beauty. Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

More than 100 packages of Milkweed seeds and 150 packages of mixed native wildflower seeds have been distributed this year. These seeds are available at the Public Library and were also handed out during the Butterfly Party. This initiative is part of an ongoing effort to support local pollinator populations by encouraging the planting of native plants, which are essential for butterflies and other pollinators.
