## Pledge Summary

Polk City is a growing community located in central Iowa, northwest of the Des Moines metro, with a population of 6500. Polk City is uniquely located between Big Creek State Park and Saylorville Lake, two thriving outdoor destinations with a variety of flora and fauna. Priding itself on outdoor recreation and natural areas, Polk City is excited to take the Mayors' Monarch Pledge. Mayor Karsjen of Polk City, IA is ready to help the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by public engagement, awareness, and providing more pollinator habitat.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Planting new milkweed plants was a priority in 2025. 20 new plants were added to several native areas throughout Polk City. 2 were added to the town square, 6 were added to existing "pollinator patches" in Lost Lake Park, and 12 were added to a new planting area at Leonard Park.

Polk City Parks and Recreation partnered with Polk City's Public Works department as well as Polk City Friends of the Parks (501c3).

Polk City prioritized the establishment of additional pollinator friendly gardens in 2025. Areas selected were Leonard Park (413 N. Parker Boulevard) and Twelve Oaks Park (1349 Twelve Oaks Drive). The Leonard Park location is on a main N-S road through Polk City and is near the Neal Smith Trail, a 26-mile regional multiuse trail.

Polk City Parks and Recreation and Public works coordinated the implementation of these areas. Polk City Friends of the Parks (501c3) provided assistance.
