The Village of Yellow Springs, Ohio--population 3700 plus--is located in SW Ohio. Home of Antioch College, we are 20 minutes east of Dayton and a quick hour west of Columbus. Glen Helen, a 1000 acre nature preserve with over 21 miles of hiking trails along with creeks and waterways that feed into the Little Miami River, runs the length of the village and connects to the Clifton Gorge State Nature Preserve and John Bryan State Park. Yellow Springs has a Wildlife Habitat Community public Facebook page with 367 members--check us out! Many villagers are re-wilding their properties under the leadership of our village Environmental Commission and NWF Certified Wildlife Habitat signs dot village yards. Mayor Pam is happy to add the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to our village efforts in support of increasing habitats for Monarchs and other pollinators. Covid really played with my plans to make contact with local educators to secure student involvement in monarch educational efforts. Our local schools—as with many others across the nation—were closed and education went on-line. When school did reopen this past fall, volunteer presence in the schools was eliminated. Both these situations drastically changed the focus of my plans.

Since this was the first year of my involvement with the Mayors' Monarch Pledge, I wanted to use much of my time for self-education on what local groups were already doing in support of these conservation efforts. I met with members of each of the above groups and will report one example of conservation efforts in effect with each group: • Village Environmental Commission: The commission supports a wetlands at the Village's Glass Farm where pollinator friendly plants and trees are maintained on the 17 acres of the 45-acre property. • Village Dept of Public Works: The Director of Public Works has ordered 50 pounds of Monarch Butterfly Wildflower Mix for use in new plantings on village-owned property. • YS Wildlife Habitat Community: The organization maintains a web site on which I have a Mayors' Monarch Pledge page for the purpose of educating the greater community on the importance of supporting our monarch population: <https://www.ysnwf.com> • Locust Hills Golf Course: Golf courses can be a wonderful resource for monarch-friendly plantings. The managers at Locust Hills--one of our closest courses to Yellow Springs—have added new pollinator/monarch plantings that abut some of their landscapes.
