Pledge Summary

The Village of Yellow Springs, Ohio, is located in the SW corner of the state. Home of Antioch College, we have a population of 3700, give or take. Located 20 minutes east of Dayton, we are a quick hour west of our state capital, Columbus. Glen Helen, a 1000 acre nature preserve with over 21 miles of hiking trails along with creeks and waterways that feed into the Little Miami Scenic River, runs the length of the village and connects to the Clifton Gorge State Nature Preserve and John Bryan State Park. Yellow Springs has a Wildlife Habitat Community public Facebook page with 552 members--check us out! Many villagers are re-wilding their properties under the leadership of our village Environmental Commission and at last count, 115 NWF Certified Wildlife Habitat signs dot village yards, including our two public schools. Mayor Pam is happy to add the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to our village efforts in support of increasing habitats for monarchs and other pollinators.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Our village has increased the number of NWF Certified Wildlife Habitat properties from 108-120 within the last two years. We are a community committed to increasing pollinator habitat and as mayor, I want to support this effort.

Two of our community gardens are located near low income housing. Our community continues to be quite diverse with a BIPOC population of 11%. Our village is located near Agraria, a sustainable farming educational center that supports the BIPOC farming network and hosts programs for Black farmers.

[They sometimes clash with my 4:00 Mayor's Court hearings.] Much of what I do is conversational education with the youth and adults who stop by my booth at our street fairs twice a year in addition to visiting the MMP booth during Earth Day and other habitat event booths I staff during the spring/summer.

I am a recreational golfer. When I travel to a new golf course whether in the area or out of state, I take a copy of the above 2 sided flyer and give it to the golf pro along with a few comments about supporting pollinators when designing changes to the course. Many are rewilding areas and it's so encouraging to see the pollinator habitats emerging instead of always-tidy annual plants arranged in rows and filling planters. Locally, our NWFF community habitat group has installed a new prairie at a local park to serve as a water filter on the slope down to the pond. The photo shows 3 of our team seeding and weeding during this, the prairie's first year. Our village Public Works Dept. worked with our habitat group to support our weeding this summer and they carefully incorporated the prairie into their mowing program, carefully clearing around the edges with their mowers.

Our local YS NWF Community Habitat publishes a quarterly column entitled Down to Earth in the weekly newspaper. I've included the most recent column as an example since it

mentions pollinators. I will be writing an upcoming column next year on the MMP and have submitted a column on Earth Day in a prior year-end report to you. I also included the copy of a handout I give out at our street fairs and other pollinator type fairs including Earth Day to explain the MMP and my yearly Action Items. I put this 2-sided document into a small plastic bag along with some butterfly stickers and a monarch magnet and give it out to children who stop by my booth. For the first time this year, our village held a Trunk or Treat Halloween event. I decorated the back of my car, put on my monarch wings and gave out candy. Next year I'll use butterfly stickers. I'm always asking the children questions about the monarchs. Usually they can answer! Surprise!

At least once a week and usually more, we can see her out working on our new pollinator prairie or doing some other supportive task in village gardens. Our YS Habitat Community Network group meets quarterly. I attend these meetings to represent the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and share the efforts I support.
