Pledge Summary

The Village of Yellow Springs, Ohio, is located in the SW corner of the state. Home of Antioch College, we have a population of 3700, give or take. Located 20 minutes east of Dayton, we are a quick hour west of our state capital, Columbus. Glen Helen, a 1000 acre nature preserve with over 21 miles of hiking trails along with creeks and waterways that feed into the Little Miami Scenic River, runs the length of the village and connects to the Clifton Gorge State Nature Preserve and John Bryan State Park. Yellow Springs has a Wildlife Habitat Community public Facebook page with 575 members--check us out! Many villagers are rewilding their properties under the leadership of our village Environmental Commission and at last count, we have over 120 NWF Certified Wildlife Habitat signs that dot village yards, including our two public schools. Mayor Pam is happy to add the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to our village efforts in support of increasing habitats for monarchs and other pollinators.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Please describe your effort in completing this action.

Three years ago I noticed about 3-4 errant common milkweed plants at the entrance to the Antioch Wellness Center on the Antioch College campus in our village. Since I went to the WC 5 days a week, I kept a close eye on the plants and had my clerk make a sign that said "These plants are milkweed. Please do not remove." Throughout the summer I kept a careful eye on the plants, harvesting their seeds in the late fall and scattering them around the ground on the circle under a beautiful maple tree where they were growing. The next year, the plants had quadrupled! This year, another sign, more seeding and more plants! I now will tend this circle as long as I'm going to the gym.

Two public venues were selected for MMP planting projects this year: 1) our pollinator prairie at Ellis Park, 2) Bill Duncan neighborhood community garden.

The community garden was planted with help from the local pre-school, who sent a class of 9 children over to "help plant." I as mayor, continued to maintain the plot throughout the summer. The village mows around the perimeter of the plot. Ellis Pollinator Prairie was weeded this year with members of the YS Hometown Habitat group. The village crew mowed the plot and hauled away our grass and weed piles.
