## Pledge Summary

The Town of Arlington is a community of approx. 50,000 located west of Boston, Massachusetts. The Town is a leader in mitigating climate change and adapting to its effects, and has a proud tradition of environmentalism.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

### Systems Change

Arlington regularly engages with low-income and POC residents in its planning procedures. Many of the Town's Pledge commitments come from previously vetted planning processes.

Data were tracked for four sites, a subset of the total Town-supported activities. Two sites are in bioswales on Egerton Road while two are located along the Minuteman Bikeway, one at the Ryder Street entrance and the other at the Bow/Frazer Street entrance.

**Please describe the maintenance schedule for these planted areas.**

Bikeway planting areas are managed for invasives monthly, have protective fencing installed for rabbit deterrence, and have a regular watering schedule dictated by the rain. The bioswales are professionally managed as well as by volunteers, with monthly monitoring and upkeep, as well as seasonal.

**Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.**

**What is the total acreage of land treated to remove invasive plants?**

226

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

The Town performs aquatic management of invasive species across 220 acres. This is a mix of manual removal (water chestnut harvesting) and chemical (algaecide, herbicides). Volunteers, supported by the Town, manage another 6 acres, approximately, purely with mechanical methods.

The Town's Master Plan, Open Space and Recreation Plan, Public Land Management Plan, and many other documents already include such criteria. An update to the Master Plan is ongoing, as is one for the Hazard Mitigation Plan. Both will reflect the priorities expressed in other Town plans, including support for the habitats monarchs rely on. Both are expected to be completed in the coming calendar year. A native planting bylaw for public lands is in the works, to be voted on in April at Town Meeting.
