Pledge Summary

Tantramar is a Municipality in Southeastern New Brunswick, Canada, with a population just less than 10,000 people. The community is on the Bay of Fundy, and is home to many significant natural assets. In 2022, it became the first city in North America to achieve Ramsar accreditation as a site with internationally significant wetlands. Andrew Black, Mayor of Tantramar, has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' Monarch pledge, and he looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the Municipality.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. We are developing a new communication plan and will be part of that as well. We are also a Bee City and we're exploring becoming a Bird City so we will incorporate all designations in our communications plans.

We are working with Nature NB and EOS Eco-Energy to plant milkweeds and other nectar-producing plants. Nature NB supplied milkweed seeds to us for our Dorchester site, and supplied 20 seed packets to participants at our Quarry Park opening. There are also Monarchs and milkweed sign at our popular community garden. We only entered the program in late summer 2025, so mowing adaptations for 2026 are now being considered.

Mowing plans are considered by our Public Works Department over the winter months for implementation when the next mowing season (usually early May) begins. We will be working with that Department over the winter to help them to improve their mowing plans as per this action item. There is also discussion in our Municipality about lawn length and other related things (which would effect native prairie and plant habitats). We have elections in May of 2026, so this might be an issue and might be followed up accordingly in 2026 (or sometime after that).

Neither document explicitly mentions monarch butterfly conservation, but they do include protection of wetlands and native species and other things that would be helpful in protecting monarch butterflies.
