Pledge Summary

Boerne, the county seat of Kendall County, is among the fastest growing and most desirable places to live in the nation, known for its historical charm, scenic Hill Country landscape, vibrant parks, and award-winning community services. With a population of approximately 22,000, Boerne is located 30 miles northwest of San Antonio, the seventh-largest city in the U.S. Positioned on the southern edge of the Edwards Plateau, the area is rich in both natural and cultural resources. The City of Boerne and Kendall County actively collaborate with various conservation-focused organizations, land trusts, and volunteer groups to educate, promote, and implement programs that support native species diversity. These partnerships have led to the protection and enhancement of habitats for native plants and pollinators, contributing to the ecological richness of this biologically diverse region.

The Cibolo Center for Conservation continues to advance Project Acorn, providing training for teachers who work with Title I schools, marginalized students, and students of color. In addition, The Texas Master Naturalists and the Native Plant Society are collaborating to encourage families to plant pollinator gardens by offering free guidance and support.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

To raise awareness about the loss of native habitats critical to monarchs and other beneficial pollinators.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Resources such as the Monarch Joint Venture's "Monarchs & More" middle school curriculum, monarch life cycles cards, and the Milkweed, Monarchs & More field guide continue to support education efforts. Additionally, the Texas Master Naturalist and Native

Plant Society chapters manage and promote the Pollinator Garden Assistance and Recognition Program (PGARP), which engages residents and encourages the planting of native and pollinator-friendly gardens.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Community interest in conserving local resources and protecting species habitats, especially monarch butterflies, remains strong and is expected to grow. Increased awareness, paired with the rapid development pressures in the Texas Hill Country, has created a heightened sense of urgency and a shared commitment to promoting and safeguarding these vital natural resources.
