## Pledge Summary

Brushy Creek Municipal Utility District is a Central Texas Community of approximately 25,000 residents. The District has a network of parks, trails, environmental preserves, landscaping, and a beautiful Community Center Garden. As part of the Brushy Creek Life, the District, the Board of Directors, and the General Manager have committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with their signing of the Mayors' monarch pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the District.

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

### Communications and Convening

- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. Many residents are new to the area (including the state and country). Providing education and seeds to get them interested in growing larval host and nectar plants by talking to them about MMP is a good introduction to conservation. Many of these residents have never gardened or had a place to garden previously. They are very excited about the chance to make a difference and help monarchs survive.

Constant Contact Newsletter - gardening tips include gardening for pollinators, we have a booth with seeds for nectar and larval host plants at events such as Garden Club Meetings (monthly), Green Thumbs Up meetings with the County Extension office (monthly), twice a year open houses, clean up events (fall and spring cleanups), Texas Recycles Day event (annually), Arbor Day (annually), Christmas tree recycling and seedling give away (annually) and similar outdoor educational events.

The maintenance department uses pollinator-friendly plants in plantings throughout the District. Monarch larval host plants and nectar plants are planted in landscaping, seed is distributed through the 32 environmental preserves for native nectar and larval plants.
