Westerville's heritage dating back to 1809, natural beauty, and careful planning make it a special place to call home. Located in the northeast corner of Ohio's fastest growing region, Westerville is a vital city of 37,000 residents, a leader in job creation, and it is located just 10 miles from the airport and the state capital of Columbus. When a community calls itself a "City Within a Park," you know there's a true dedication to parks and recreation. With more than 650 acres of parkland, 18,000 trees, and 51 miles of trails, Westerville lives up to this vision. In fact, thanks to years thoughtful planning, 95% of City homes are located within a half-mile of a park.
