The City of San Luis Obispo is located on the Central Coast of California and is in the path of the Monarch migration. We have a documented roosting site in town that we are monitoring, are working with community groups to increase pollinator plants and habitat around town in support of this iconic species. Mayor Erica A Stewart and all city staff are committed to supporting the Pledge and working on Monarch butterfly protection!

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat program).

We are looking at planting opportunities in park lands located in marginalized community parts of the City.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

With a documented roosting site in the City limits, and several other roosting locations across the City, we are taking a stance to protect and enhance where we can in support of this iconic species that has suffered from different threats in the past number of years.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The City was successful in securing 2 hedgerow pollinator kits from the Xerces Society that were installed along Prefumo Creek and the City Farm property. Programs like this would be helpful to expand the reach of the conservation and education efforts moving forward. We also have a Beautification Gardner position created and filled to add bandwidth to expand plantings to more park lands across the City for all community members to experience.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We are in the planning phase of 2 locations for habitat and roosting enhancement. The Promontory property has a few trees that have died in the near past so planning what species and where to put new trees to support the micro-habitat and roosting needs and the cemetery property needs new trees since the trees present are getting too big or have died to support the preferred habitat requirements for Monarchs. One of our community partner neighborhoods planted milkweed and nectar plants in the park they have adopted and they are growing well.

These groups were able to install nectar plants and native milkweed to new land owned by the City. We continue to engage with our Parks Division where native milkweed is located to prevent it from being mowed and educating the Parks staff members about the importance of these plants. The Beatification Gardner was recently hired, and we will be working closely with him to expand the installation of nectar plants across the City and in our downtown core; Mission Plaza.

What species were collected or propagated?

We collected Narrow-leaf milkweed seeds from a large population to get seedlings started.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to host the event?

We partnered with the California Conservation Corps, City Utilities staff and the Monarch Joint Venture for the seed collection effort.

Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.

There is a large population of narrow-leaf milkweed at the southern edge of a bioretention basin and when the plants set seed, we collected several hundred seeds to propagate and distribute at Farmers Market and other events hosted by the City and other organizations to educate the community and offer them resources to help the monarchs by planting milkweed and nectar gardens around the City.
