Pledge Summary

West Chicago is a diverse, family-oriented community with a population of roughly 27,100. The City is located approximately 30 miles west of the City of Chicago, with a rich cultural mix and a proud heritage. Mayor Pineda's commitment to saving the monarch butterfly started in 2017 when he signed his first Mayor's Monarch Pledge. He looks forward to continuing efforts to educate the public on the importance of the monarch butterfly and other pollinators, and demonstrate how the community can help save them by planting native milkweed and other pollinator-friendly native nectar plants.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

Please describe your effort in completing this action.

Maintenance of City and Park District plantings continued in 2021. The park district had to replant many milkweed plants in 2021 due to aphids. The Maintenance Director found a simple and effective solution on line using Dawn dish soap. West Chicago Park District also added and is maintaining a 2.5 Acre solar field The Solar Energy Project began in 2018 with a focus on sustainability. West Chicago Park District partnered with Trane Technologies. The project utilizes idle land and will in turn reduce the cost of utilities. Solar panels have been installed on the West side of ZONE250 inside Reed-Keppler Park. The 862 kW Grid-Interactive Photovoltaic system will produce 1,150,000 kWh annually helping to offset costs of 84% of energy used by the ARC Center and Zone 250 per year and will save the District approximately one million dollars over the 20 year commitment with Trane Technologies. There 2.5 acre field has been planted with pollinator plantings
