Our community members continue to establish their own gardens, and the City has initiated a Master Plan for a new community park that will have area of natural habitat installed as part of the process. This initiative is anticipated to occur within the next two years.

West Chicago's community has a large Hispanic or Latino population (estimated at 48.5% by U.S. Census), providing the City with an opportunity to leverage the Program to engage multiple cultures.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Many of the City's community members have an origin from Michoacán, Mexico, which has a very large role in the monarch butterfly migration.

In 2023, the West Chicago City Council approved a Community Park Master Plan after extensive work with its consultant, City staff, and community members. This Plan outlines the various phases that will span over an extended timeframe to bring to life a new community park. As part of the Plan, the initial phase will consist of establishing a natural planting area. This is expected to commence in one to two years. How many plants were sold and/or given away at your event?

Approximately 5,000 plants, including perennials, shrubs, trees, and vegetables, were available for the City's Blooming Fest event plant sale. The sale exceeded its fundraising goal of \$10,000, netting \$13,727 which will more than cover the West Chicago Garden Club's annual budget for 2024.

The City of West Chicago organized Blooming Fest annually, and the community's garden club, West Chicago Garden Club, organizes a large plant sale that occurs during the event. Additionally, over 60 vendors fill the downtown streets and sell various items, including items specific to garden enthusiasts.
